Annual Tree Ban Takes Affect

The annual ban on pruning elm trees is now in effect. This ban began April 1st and runs until August 31st. During this time period it is illegal to prune elm trees to prevent the spread of Dutch Elm disease (DED). Warm weather makes the elm bark beetle that spreads DED more active. Trees with open wounds from pruning attract these insects, increasing the chance of infection.


These beetles breed in dead and dying elm wood. By not pruning your trees they will be healthier and better able to resist disease. You can however remove an elm tree during the ban period, but it's important to dispose of all elm wood promptly and properly. Elm trees must be burned or buried, the stump must be cut 2 inches under ground level and then covered with two inches of soil.

To prevent the spread of DED, as well as other insects and diseases, it is illegal to use, transport, store or sell elm firewood. Regulations also restrict the use, transport, storage and sale of elm logs.

Speaking of winter 2022, this was one of the worst winters in many years as we all know. We haven't seen snow and wind to this extent in years and it posed many challenges to the Towns ability to clear snow and ice from our streets. A huge thank you goes out to our Public Works crew for their efforts in dealing with the problem. Our Operations team is continually looking at ways to improve our ability to handle the huge snowfalls and be more efficient in this task.

Once the snow melt has finished, ground work will begin on our new Water Treatment Plant. Current project timelines has construction of the building itself set to begin in late summer. World supply chain issues are proving to be a challenge for us but our engineers are confident we will be able to bring the new plant online in 2024 as scheduled

Some members of council and administration attended this year's SUMA conference in Regina earlier this month. As usual it was an informative few days with lots of knowledge gained and contacts made. Councilor's Bot and Pfeifer each raised a question from the floor during the Bear Pit session with the government, pointing out the state of our hospital and the highways in our area. Council will be extending an invite to the Health and Highway Ministers to visit Esterhazy in the near future so they can see firsthand our concerns.

Council is also sponsoring an online petition regarding our need for a new hospital and care home multiplex facility . This petition will be available in the near future and I encourage everyone to sign the petition and show their support. For those without access to the petition online, the staff at the Town Office is currently working on an alternative to allow you to still sign and have your support noted.

Spring is budget time and council is beginning the budgeting process. As always, our focus is on keeping tax increases to a minimum while continuing to provide the services that you want and need. Unfortunately, with the current inflation levels we are experiencing, the price of oil and the Carbon Tax, this is proving to be a challenge. Council dislikes tax increases as much as anyone – we pay them too!

With the removal of the Covid restrictions in the province we should have a somewhat normal spring in town. I hope everyone gets out and enjoys things like playing ball, swimming, soccer and golf once again. Fingers crossed for a normal summer again!
